A note from the Administrator- Jayna

In between all the rain, our home is getting some much needed exterior brick replacement and repair. Over the years, the brick in multiple areas of the building have deteriorated. Plans for this project started over a year ago with bids from multiple contractors, so we were fortunate when a local mason agreed to do our project within our budget. The most significant and visual repair is by the front entrance in our Angel Courtyard. This courtyard is an enclosed courtyard that allows residents to enjoy sun-filled days out in nature safely. Of course, during this project this courtyard is not safe and is temporarily closed, so it is a blessing that we also have the North Courtyard. This is also a safe option for our Grandfriends to enjoy the outdoors.

The instability of the two pillars that hold the gate to the Angel Courtyard were the first indication that our brick wall that also holds the wrought iron fence needed attention. To fix the pillars and brick wall, Andy's Masonry has to remove the Kasota stone cap and either remove some rows of the brick or completely demo the brick to the ground. The two pillars had to be completely replaced. Once the brick is relayed, new concrete caps will be poured on top of the brick wall to seal up underneath and prevent water damage in the future. The wrought iron fence is also getting power washed and painted before attached back to the brick. Once completed, the entire courtyard wall will be washed with brick detergent to make it look new again. The other areas already repaired around the building do look new again after this washing.

Besides some water in our crawlspace, we are lucky that the rain has only delayed some of our projects and our outdoor plans. Others have not been so fortunate with flooded basements and homes due to downpours and rising rivers. While flooding is not a major concern for Divine based on our risk assessment, we do still have a Flood policy in our Emergency Operations Plan. Severe weather such as thunderstorms, tornadoes, or ice storms are more likely to occur. Even though we have two generators, loss of power is also a high concern. The generators only supply minimal electricity to designated areas.

Every year our Emergency Operations Plan is updated and our plans are tested. We believe it is important everyone understand some of the measures we are taking to help keep our Grandfriends and co-workers safe during any disaster. We have plans to defend in place if possible and simply move to a different part of the building, but if that is not an option, we also have plans for evacuation either temporarily to St. Mary's School or the Sleepy Eye Event Center. If the problem cannot be resolved within a few hours and the home cannot be reentered, we would relocate residents to other nursing homes or hospitals until it is safe to return. The goal is to keep everyone safe during any type of emergency.
