


### Monthly Therapy Chat: Benign Paroxysmal Positional Veritgo by Ashley Remus, Rehab Director

Do you ever feel dizzy with a sudden spinning sensation triggered by head movements? This may be what is called Benign Paroxysmal Positional Vertigo (BPPV). Calcium

crystals in the ear become dislodged and when the head moves the dislodged crystals shift within the ear canal. This stimulation can then send a false signal to the brain which causes the symptoms of vertigo. Therapy can help patients resolve this issue by completing an assessment for BPPV. If the assessment (Dix-Hallpike maneuver) is positive, the therapist would then proceed with the canalith repositioning treatment. Many people find relief after just one treatment. If you are experiencing any symptoms of vertigo, consult with your doctor who may give you therapy orders to treat this condition.
